

OVERVIEW

This feedback report has been prepared by BECG, on behalf of The Green Quarter, to report on the community engagement work undertaken between September and December 2022. The work has sought to reinvigorate and refresh relationships with the local community and seek feedback on stakeholders' views of The Green Quarter and the wider Southall area.

The Green Quarter is one of London's most significant and important regeneration projects, transforming a disregarded brownfield site into a new neighbourhood with nature at its heart. The last major consultation exercise was undertaken in 2014 and since then Southall has significantly evolved, with The Green Quarter becoming home to a thriving community of people with around a thousand new residents already living there.

The feedback from 2014 has allowed us to compare our recent results to see whether what were considered priorities then are still considered priorities now. The feedback remains similar in places, with the main concerns still revolving around traffic congestion, crime and safety. Southall's diverse culture still remains a strong positive in our results.

Berkeley runs regular events for the local community, including summer screening events, a Christmas celebration, and the opening of a community mural on the Grand Union Canal. All these events are designed to connect the new and existing communities and show Southall how The Green Quarter will help transform the area, bringing much needed homes, job opportunities, and places to enjoy nature.

In resetting community engagement activity, Berkeley – working with BECG, independent community engagement consultants – have undertaken a comprehensive programme of activity.

OVERVIEW



Social media campaign:

To raise awareness of the survey and target a wider audience from the local community, a digital advertising campaign was put in place using Instagram and Facebook. The campaign was seen by over 30,000 people and led to 913 click throughs to the website and survey.



Door knocking:

To reach the nearest neighbours in person, door knocking sessions have been conducted, targeting residents of Beaconsfield Road, Grange Road, Lewis Road, and Hanson Gardens. The project team knocked on over 1,000 doors and delivered materials including the newsletter, survey and a dedicated door knocking card, with over 100 direct conversations taking place on the doorstep.



Street stall:

A street stall was held, handing out newsletters, feedback forms and freepost envelopes to commuters outside Southall Station, before moving further down South Road to hand out materials and engage Southall residents at the junction of South Road and Southall Broadway. Over 125 separate conversations took place during a full day of activity.



Christmas event:

A dedicated stall was held at The Green Quarter Christmas event, handing out newsletters, feedback forms, freepost envelopes and conducting surveys on tablets. Around 90 separate discussions were held.



Community engagement steering group:

A community engagement steering group was set up with local stakeholders from all sectors (residents, local business, local politicians etc.). An introductory drop-in session was held on November 2. The group contains 21 members and had it's first meeting on January 31st. The group will help guide and advise on community activity at The Green Quarter.



Consultation website:

A new website was launched on 14th October, that featured all relevant information about the project, community events, and hosted a feedback survey. Since launching the website recorded 1,470 new users. The website can be found at: https://thegreenquartercommunity.co.uk/



Contact email:

A dedicated inbox and email address was provided for the local community to reach out to the project team. The email was monitored daily, and requests and questions were forwarded to the relevant member of the project team. 
Newsletter:


A four page newsletter was produced, informing the community about the latest news from The Green Quarter, updates on community activity, the feedback survey and details of how residents could get in touch with the project team. The newsletter also contained information in nine of the most used languages and dialects common to the community living in Southall. The newsletter was emailed to those registered for electronic updates and delivered to over 6,000 addresses around the site.

SUMMARY OF FEEDBACK RESULTS

- 145 feedback forms received to date the majority of which were completed online. Approximately 12% of forms were handed in using the free post envelopes.
- 60% of respondents were Southall residents, 23% of respondents live at The Green Quarter, 7% indicated they were responding on behalf of a business, 6% indicated they work in the area, and 4% indicated they were responding on behalf of a community group.
- 25-34 was the most common age range indicated by respondents, followed by 35-44. There was an unusually high level of respondents who indicated they were between the age of 13-17. This may have been the default option for those unwilling to share their age, or not wishing to receive marketing materials.
- 45% of respondents stated that they were aware of what was happening at The Green Quarter.
- 52% of respondents had attended at least one event at The Green Quarter.
- Respondents were overwhelmingly supportive of the provision of new homes and new green space at The Green Quarter, with 63% and 85% respectively of respondents providing a score of 6 or higher to each question.

- Respondents expressed a notable interest in seeing an increase in the provision of shops and restaurants on site, with 65% of all respondents indicating this preference.
- Traffic congestion, crime & anti-social behaviour, air quality and a lack of green space were the four issues of greatest concern to respondents.
- Respondents were divided about if Southall is a great place to live and if they felt part of the community with 47% and 54% respectively providing a score of 6 or higher to these two questions.
- Respondents stated that the best thing about living in Southall is access to public transport, diversity, shops, restaurants, parks and green space.
- The main concerns about Southall are traffic congestion, crime, antisocial behaviour and air quality. While parks and green space were recorded as a good thing about living in Southall, respondents also identified that more could be done stating that there is still a lack of parks and green space.
- The provision of affordable homes, health facilities parks and green space were identified as needed in Southall by respondents.





THE STORY SO FAR

Phase 1

Phase 1 is home to around 1,000 residents, with 623 quality new homes delivered. Circa 50% of these homes are affordable homes for Clarion Housing and Catalyst.

Affordable housing delivery was accelerated in Phase 1 with the help of London Borough of Ealing and the Housing Zone Agreement.



With 645 homes under construction in Phase 3 and a new detailed planning consent for Phase 2 - the first 3 phases will deliver a mixed tenure of high quality new homes.

Phase 2 will also deliver an extensive commercial offering including a community centre, health care, offices, retail and restaurants.

WEBSITE

The dedicated project website was central to The Green Quarter engagement programme and was where most survey responses were completed.

The website launched on October 14 and has had 1,476 users and 1,836 pageviews. The most pageviews were recorded in the beginning of November after the newsletter was sent, with smaller spikes recorded after door knocking, the street stalls and Christmas event.

NEWSLETTER

A newsletter was created containing information about The Green Quarter, how people can provide their feedback and how to contact members of the project team.

The newsletter was sent to 6,024 addresses within the immediate vicinity of the site and a digital copy was emailed out to those registered for electronic updates. The newsletter was also distributed during the knocking session as well as the street stalls, and during The Green Quarter Christmas event.






SOCIAL MEDIA CAMPAIGN

A social media advertising campaign ran on Facebook and Instagram between 11th November and 14th December. The advertising was changed during this time to increase the reach and encourage more click throughs to the website and survey. From December, the audience was extended to 7km from the site and focused on one advert only – marked in red below.



DOOR KNOCKING

Door knocking sessions were carried out by members of the BECG project Team. These sessions took place along Beaconsfield Road, Grange Road, Lewis Road, and Hanson Gardens.





During the session a printed copy of the newsletter and a printed copy of the feedback form were handed to residents. At addresses where no one opened the door, a newsletter, survey form and a freepost envelope were left in the mailbox to allow residents to fill out the form and send it back. During these two sessions over 1,000 doors were knocked and approximately 100 conversations were held on the doorsteps.

STREET STALL

A street stall was organised on 7th December where the newsletter, the feedback form and freepost envelopes were handed out to commuters and residents outside of Southall Station. Afterwards the team moved further down South Road and continued handing out the information and feedback material at the junction of South Road and Southall Broadway.

During the stall the team had approximately 125 interactions with hundreds more newsletters and feedback forms given out to residents and commuters.



Community Engagement Steering Group

Alongside the engagement work, a Community Engagement Steering Group has also been set up to help drive the community work at The Green Quarter. A drop-in session was held on Thursday 3rd November to promote the purpose of the group with local stakeholders. This was attended by 18 stakeholders, including residents, businesses, community groups, education, the police, environmental groups, and Ealing Council.

The three core objectives of the group will be to:

- Bring together local community experts and groups to help develop and implement our community activity
- 2. Advise on community events, partnerships, and projects that will strengthen and deepen community relationships
- 3. Manage the Community Chest programme a series of direct local grants to support community enterprises and activities

The group has now been formalised, with 18 confirmed members, and held its first meeting on 31st January 2023. It will meet four times a year and will be chaired by independent consultants from BECG. The group will report back through an Annual Report, which will be distributed to local addresses, like the regular community newsletter.





CHRISTMAS EVENT

On 7th December, The Green Quarter organised a Christmas event open to the entire Southall community. BECG supported the organisation by using the existing channels to promote the event.

During the event, BECG team members engaged participants by handing out newsletters, feedback forms and freepost envelopes. Event attendees were also invited to fill out the survey on the spot using tablets.

During the event approximately 90 interactions were held. All remaining feedback material was either laid out for participants to take home or handed over to the The Green Quarter project team.






RESPONSE TO ENGAGEMENT

The following bullet points summarise how the community responded to the engagement activities:

- The response from residents to our engagement activity was generally ambivalent or positive. There was, however, a pocket of discontent towards the end of Beaconsfield Road, where residents took issue with a re-occuring smell, noise from the construction site and loss of views.
- There are still a substantial number of residents who do not really understand what is happening at The Green Quarter, despite their proximity to the site. However, many of these residents appear to take little interest in the community more generally.
- There was notable interest in learning more about the development given the large display outside Southall Station.
- Residents were incredibly happy to hear about the new green space, wildlife habitats, and water features, and that these spaces were for the whole

- Southall community rather than just residents of The Green Quarter.
- Residents were happy to hear about improved transport links.
- While not typically a group that is responsive to engagement efforts, young adults took notable interest in the development owing to the provision of new housing.
- Older adults were very receptive to our efforts and often asked several questions about the development.
- There was some knowledge of the provision of community space, with a few questions on this topic.
- The Christmas event was very well received by Southall residents, with several expressions of thanks received by the engagement team.






COMMUNITY FEEDBACK

BECG has received a total of **145** feedback forms. The tables and pie charts set out below report the responses to the questions asked on the feedback form.


Most respondents chose to feedback via the online survey provided on the website. Approximately 12% of feedback was received as a hard copy via freepost.

83 respondents stated that they were residents, 31 said they live at The Green Quarter, 10 are a business, 5 represent a Community Group and 9 respondents work in Southall.


Respondents' Age



Q1. How aware are you of what is happening at The Green Quarter?


The table below analyses how aware respondents were of what is happening at The Green Quarter.

52% of respondents stated they had attend one or more Green Quarter events. 48% of respondents stated that they had never attend an event.





Q3. I support the provision of new homes at The Green Quarter


The table below analyses the position of respondents regarding the provision of new homes at The Green Quarter.

Distribution of responses:






Q4. I support the provision of new greenspace, parks, and wetlands at The Green Quarter


The table below analyses the position of respondents regarding the provision of new greenspace, parks, and wetlands at The Green Quarter.




Q5. I would like to see The Green Quarter provide more:

The table below analyses the position of respondents regarding the provision of new greenspace, parks, and wetlands at The Green Quarter.




A total of 461 answers were given for question 5 (respondents were able to choose up to 4 options).

The table below analyses the position of respondents stating that Southall is a great place to live.














Distribution of responses:

The chart below shows the position of respondents regarding the best thing about living in Southall. (Up to four options could be chosen)




A total of 309 answers were given for question 8.

Most respondents say the best thing about living in Southall is Access to public transport (86), its Diversity (63), Shops & Restaurants (55) and Parks and Green Space (37). Respondents also chose School (36) as a good thing about living in Southall. Southall's safety (20) and healthcare (12) was not ranked as the best things about living in Southall for most respondents.


Q9. My main concerns for Southall are:

A total of 387 answers were given for question 9.


Most respondents say their two main concerns for Southall are Traffic Congestion (92) and Crime and Anti-Social Behaviour (83). Air Quality (57) and Lack of green space (52) are also amongst the top 4 answers given. Lack of Housing (20) or Lack of public transport (8) don't seem to be of concern for most respondents.



Q10. I can see myself living in Southall in 10 years' time


The table below analyses the position of respondents stating that they can see themselves living in Southall in 10 years' time.

A minority (36%) of respondents stated that they can see themselves living in Southall in 10 years' time. 44 (42%) of respondents stated that they couldn't see themselves living in Southall in 10 years' time (Options 1-4). 20 respondents stated option 5 (Somewhat). No clear answer can be given based on these results. Respondents thinking about living in Southall long term is very diverse.

"Southall has become a horrible place to live. I am leaving Southall after 32 years, sad to see the town I grew up in is unrecognisable. The main reasons I cannot live here any longer is the lack of Parking and health services due to overcrowding."

"Keep up the good work. Why are other developers not doing the same and raising the bar."

"Anti-social behaviour and the behaviour of the residents is really off putting. Littering, dog fouling, weed smoking, playing loud music from cars/ external speakers, using the internal roads around The Green Quarter as speed racetrack, and using the development as a congregation/ socialisation area does not make this an enjoyable place to live."

CONCLUSION

This report showcases the extensive efforts we have undertaken to understand the views of the Southall community, which will help tailor the delivery of The Green Quarter to meet not only the needs of the people who live there, but also the needs for Southall in the future.

From the very inception of our plans for The Green Quarter, the delivery of a truly integrated development has been a key priority. This is demonstrated by our long history of extensive consultation engagement and our continued delivery of a site with considerable amenity, including green spaces, wildlife areas, and improved transport connectivity, for the benefit of the whole Southall community.

Much of the feedback we received was online, highlighting the notable shift in community engagement patterns in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic. In our engagement with the Southall community, we continue to utilise a truly hybrid strategy spanning both online and traditional mediums, providing both older and younger generations alike the same opportunity to offer their views on how we can make Southall a better place to live and work.

Our last major consultation exercise was in 2014, and we have used the feedback we collected then to see how Southall residents' views have changed in the interim. We found that the priorities and needs of Southall residents have changed considerably. In 2014 transport links were identified as a major need, but today residents list this as one of Southall's greatest strengths, which can be attributed in large part to the phased opening of the Elizabeth line. Residents identify housing as a much greater need today than in 2014, which is understandable given the extent to which housing scarcity has increased during this period. The provision of green space, ranked as a moderate need in 2014, is of considerably greater importance to Southall residents today.

This can be attributed to the increased urbanisation of the Southall area, and indeed the entirety of London, as the population of the capital has continued to grow. Residents' views on other issues, such as the need for more retail, desire to see less traffic congestion and desire to see less crime have remained constant throughout the period. We welcome the results of this re-examination, which again shows that we are anticipating the changing needs of the community and meeting those needs as they develop.

To date, we have actively sought to respond to the needs and concerns of the Southall community through our work at The Green Quarter. Whether that is through the provision of green space, the positive effect of this green space on air quality, or improved transport links which will include new bus routes, we have actively shaped our offering to provide real community benefit.

It is also important to reflect on how, moving forward, we are going to continue to do our part to make Southall a better place to live and work. We are going to persist with our extensive consultation efforts and remain highly agile to the feedback we receive, shaping our vision and priorities in line with changing community sentiment. We are going to continue to enact our plans for new green space and transport links. We are going to continue to make sure that the Southall community feels welcome at The Green Quarter through our events and outreach programs.

In the future, we hope that a much larger proportion of Southall residents' can see themselves in the area in 10 years time, and we hope that this will be, in some part, due to our work at The Green Quarter – providing homes to new and existing Southall residents alike and contributing to placemaking through our efforts to deliver a truly integrated development with significant community benefit.

Comments

9 people said no or nope.

Southall is a very vibrant and alive, but is dirty... the habit of dumping rubbish next to the trees in the street is something that you cannot notice... Southall also need more control Drugs and gangs are always around. You can feel it and for these reason you don't feel safe. More police would be a good start. Finally... I love spices and spice food, but I am Italian... searching for my type of food is a challenge!!!

A lot of people who came here in the 1960s have moved out and rent out their houses back in the 70s/80s it was great living here. Neighbours knew each other, people were keen to integrate/learn the language, we grew up celebrating Christmas, Easter etc and had a respect for other religions/cultures/festivities. Now the people who move here have turned Southall into a slum. A lot are tenants who have no desire to clean their houses/outside aardens. They attract vermin/pests. They do not have any desire to learn English, integrate, celebrate other religions festivities. The people who have moved here over the last 10-15 years have the mentality/mindset of the country they moved from. Building more houses will bring in some decent people, but many who will add no benefit to Southall and just turn it into a bigger slum. The Broadway is filthy. When there are religious occasions, it means spending 2 hours being stuck in traffic trying to travel 2 miles. What makes it worse is that the people who are causing the congestion/anti social behaviour that follows later in the day live far away and come here to cause disruption. Residents Parking is limited. If we get home after, say, 10pm, at times it means parking on another road. Southall was a lovely place whilst growing up, but is now horrible. I could go on, but what's the point!

Comments

Southall has become a horrible place to live. I am leaving Southall after 32 years, sad to see the town I grew up in is unrecognisable. The main reasons I cannot live here any longer is the lack of Parking and health services due to over crowding. Every house is now a HMO with 4 or 5 cars per house and we still have to pay for parking permits and can never find parking outside. Can never get a doctors appointment they never pick up the phone. Southall is also very dirty with litter on the streets and rats I have seen in broad daylight, there are people dealing drugs openly, prostitution, catalyst convertor thefts going on all the time. No local police station or Police presence, and lastly the amount of high rise flats in the area has ruined the town completely. They are not being sold as affordable homes but instead sold to property investors. Berkley homes is the face of all these changes and cannot be trusted

The main bug bear of living in Southall is the Traffic and the predominantly Asian shops and restaurants

Are you going to gate the development at the A312 end exclusive for your residents?

If you are and existing Southall residents can't use it, like you can the existing streets, then expect trouble?

People tend to congregate on curb-sides to eat a takeaway and leave the litter behind. They also smoke so called "laughing gas" and leave their canisters behind. This is just to highlight a few examples. There are many more. The playground area is often overcrowded with a lot of kids using the water features as a swimming pool. All of this causes far too much noise especially during school holidays/ weekends which doesn't enable many residents to enjoy their outdoor spaces/ or relax on holidays/ weekends.

Furthermore, the noise pollution is awful, especially over the summer when all the families from the surrounding areas overcrowd the small play park. Bigger and better place space away from the apartments would be useful with some other policies introduced to limit noise.

Local residents shoulder high service charges. New retailers should be run by residents and/or should contribute towards reducing the service charges of the residents. The Green Quarter residents should see more benefits from the local area, like this. This would help to build a stronger sense of community and belonging as opposed to the current situation in which we all retreat within our own flats/blocks.

Noise pollution from playpark, parties and fireworks is unbearable. Lacks variety in shops and entertainment (e. g. Pubs, coffee shops, cinema) Damage to facilities from people who don't live in Green Quarter not fair. Cannot use playground because too many people.

I used to walk on the footpath adjacent to the railway line . Recently it's become unsafe . I would welcome additional security. Also the children make a mess and no one takes ownership on clearing up . Maybe additional patrols would help .
